Re: Limiting CBP Detention of Pregnant, Postpartum, and/or Nursing Individuals

Dear CBP Commissioner Miller,

We write once more concerning U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP)'s treatment of people who are pregnant, postpartum, and/or nursing.<sup>1</sup> Specifically, we write to deliver a petition signed by **1,462 individuals and 138 immigrants' rights, reproductive justice, medical, and human rights organizations** urging CBP to strictly limit its detention of people who are pregnant, postpartum, and/or nursing, and their families, to the minimum time period necessary to process them for release to networks of care in the United States.

Organizational signatories include Planned Parenthood, Human Rights Watch, and Doctors for America, in addition to our organizations, the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU), the ACLU of San Diego & Imperial Counties, the Center for Immigration Law and Policy at UCLA Law, and Jewish Family Service of San Diego, which have collectively been in dialogue with CBP and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) about this issue for over four years.

Our communication with CBP and DHS began in April 2020, when we demanded an investigation into the harrowing experience of Ana, who was forced to give birth in CBP custody at the Chula Vista Border Patrol Station, without adequate medical care and while holding onto a

garbage can for support, and who was forced to return to the station for a night of postpartum detention with her newborn baby.<sup>2</sup>

We acknowledge that in November 2021, CBP issued updated guidance regarding the agency's treatment of pregnant, postpartum, and nursing individuals.<sup>3</sup> As we have previously raised, that guidance falls significantly short of what is needed to properly address the needs of this population; namely, it fails to direct agents to expedite processing and release for this population. Indeed, since the release of the November 2021 guidance, we have written to and otherwise engaged with CBP on numerous occasions to share additional disturbing accounts of mistreatment of pregnant, postpartum, and nursing individuals and their babies, including the case of a pregnant woman with an active infection who was detained for *16 days* in Border Patrol custody; and that of a nursing mother and her six-month-old baby who were verbally abused and denied medical assistance for four days, despite the baby having respiratory problems that the mother disclosed to the agents.<sup>4</sup>

We know that CBP could prevent each and every one of these traumatic experiences by adopting the immediate, life-saving, and common-sense policy recommendations that we have made in previous communications and repeat below—now with the support of *1,600 individual and organizational signatories*:

- Expedite CBP processing and release of people who are pregnant, postpartum, and/or nursing, and their families, to ensure that any period of CBP detention of members of this population is limited to the time period necessary to process them for release from CBP custody. In no case should custody exceed 12 hours from the time of initial apprehension.
- Ensure that, together with their families, people who are pregnant, postpartum, and/or nursing are released from CBP custody as soon as possible after any discharge from an offsite hospital and are not transferred back to CBP detention for any purposes, including processing.

As you know, adopting these recommendations would bring CBP policy in line with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)'s recognition that this vulnerable population should not be detained absent rare circumstances.<sup>5</sup>

Dear CBP Commissioner Miller,

I urge U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to protect the health and wellbeing of pregnant, postpartum, and nursing parents, and their children. Even after numerous instances in which pregnant mothers have been subjected to unsafe conditions without access to adequate medical care — and even forced to give birth while in a CBP facility — CBP continues to detain this vulnerable population for days and sometimes weeks at a time when they need community care most. This is unacceptable.

CBP must limit its detention of people who are pregnant, postpartum, and/or nursing, and their families to the minimum time period necessary to process them for release to networks of care in the United States.

I urge immediate, life-saving, and common sense changes in CBP policy to protect people who are pregnant, postpartum, and/or nursing, and their families, including to:

- Limit the time that CBP detains people who are pregnant, postpartum, and/or nursing, and their families, to the time period necessary to process them for release. In no case should detention exceed 12 hours from the time of initial apprehension.
- Ensure that medically vulnerable individuals who receive care in an offsite hospital are not transferred back to CBP detention with their families upon discharge to ensure their safety and continuity of care.

CBP's current policies and practices are morally deficient and inhumane. They fail to protect the reproductive health of pregnant, postpartum, and nursing parents in CBP custody, and they are inconsistent with DHS's recognition that this medically vulnerable population should not be detained except in rare circumstances.

The only way to protect the health and dignity of pregnant, postpartum, and nursing parents, and their children is to limit their detention altogether.

I urge you to exercise moral leadership by protecting the health and dignity of this vulnerable population.
